

Early Learning Scholarships Opportunity

"This project is made possible by funding received through Grant Number 90TP0079-01, of the USDHHS-Administration for Children and Families, Office of Early Childhood; Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services; Nebraska Department of Education; and Nebraska Children and Families Foundation, following grant requirements of 70% federal funding with 30% match from state and private resources."

Purpose

The Early Learning Scholarships program is intended to support working families in meeting the high cost of quality care for children 6 weeks - 6 years in full day/full year settings (not attending kindergarten) or attending the Program due to a need for care that extends beyond the hours provided by a publicly funded program (i.e. wrapping hours around Head Start or Public Preschool).

Support includes increasing access to high quality care for young children in low and moderate earning families in Nebraska. Funding is being made available through communities to early childhood providers engaged in delivery of quality early learning environments and experiences for young children.

Community

Community Eligibility:

- Indicated interest in the Early Learning Scholarship opportunity on letter of interest and submitted by due date
- Developed a sustainability fundraising plan to continue scholarships after the PDG funds expire
- Based on all communities expressing interest in the ELS, the percentage of households whose income places them below the federal poverty line ranked highest by population level tiers
- Have at least one licensed child care provider that is nationally accredited and/or at a Step 1 (or higher) in the Step Up to Quality rating system with a plan to reach Step 2 or higher within 12 months

Community Requirements:

- Utilize the ECCC (or designated community coordinator) to manage and execute the requirements of the ELS opportunity which includes working with providers, families, data tracking and evaluation
- Have the ability to issue reimbursement to early learning scholarships to providers on a monthly basis

Providers

Provider Eligibility:

- Licensed and in good standing
- Enrolled in Step Up to Quality at Step 1 (or higher) and have a plan to achieve Step 2 or higher within 12 months, and/or nationally accredited
- Programs must have a contract (or be willing to obtain a contract) with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services to provide care for families on child care subsidy and must be serving at least one child (or be willing to serve children) on subsidy
- Implementing or planning to implement social emotional curricula such as Pyramid Model, Second Steps, etc.
- Providing Infant/Toddler Care

Provider Requirements:

- Programs must have, or will agree to put a process into place, to assure that potentially eligible families are receiving state subsidized dollars before a scholarship is awarded
- Agree to provide and maintain systems for detailed records of tuition assistance provided to eligible families, including attendance records
- Agree to provide required data for a collective evaluation
- Agree to keep completed family applications for scholarship program current and on file for up to three years
- Agree to submit monthly reimbursement forms to Early Childhood Community Coordinator or designated community coordinator
- Regular communication with the Early Childhood Community Coordinator or designated community coordinator

Families/Children

Criteria for Children/Families:

- Provide documentation that family does not qualify for full state subsidized care
- Enrolled and attending full day, full-year care or attending the Program due to a need for care that extends beyond the hours provided by a publicly funded program (i.e. wrapping hours around Head Start or Public Preschool)
- Child(ren) 6 weeks to six (6) years (Pre-K only)
- Fall into outlined income guidelines for under 200% Federal Poverty Guidelines (proof of income for all working adults in the household)

Funding

Funding amounts range from \$10,000 to \$65,000 per year depending on the population size and poverty level of the contracting community. Funds are intended to assist families at an average of \$5,000 per child. An Early Learning Scholarship Contract, or amendment if applicable, will be issued with the community's designated fiscal sponsor. Once this contract is in place, funds will be sent to the community's designated fiscal sponsor. An initial payment of two months, or 16.5%, of the total agreed upon amount will be sent as a start-up fund. The remaining amount will be based on reimbursement only and will be paid once all documentation is received and approved. The Fiscal Sponsor must establish a Memorandum of Understanding with each provider to receive funds for this activity. The Fiscal Sponsor will pay the provider(s) directly. If the Fiscal Sponsor is also the provider, required documentation for children served will be required for reimbursement.

Required Documents

- Submission of a community early childhood work plan that incorporates logic model components that align with Early Learning Scholarships
 - Logic model components create a road map for the project that include:
 - Inputs: The resources needed to implement the activities
 - Activities: What the program and its staff do with those resources
 - Outputs: Tangible products, capacities, or deliverables that result from the activities
 - Outcomes: Changes that occur in other people or conditions because of the activities and outputs
 - Impacts: (Sometimes)The most long-term outcomes
- Sustainability plan to continue Early Learning Scholarships after PDG funds expire
- Partnering provider form
- Scholarship application (if different from the one provided)
- Application(s) and letter(s) of commitment from child care providers

Early Learning Scholarship Eligibility

"This project is made possible by funding received through Grant Number 90TP0079-01, of the USDHHS-Administration for Children and Families, Office of Early Childhood; Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services; Nebraska Department of Education; and Nebraska Children and Families Foundation, following grant requirements of 70% federal funding with 30% match from state and private resources."

Eligibility Requirements for Families and Children

Tuition assistance – Early Learning Scholarships (ELS) may be available to families who meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Children between the ages of 6 weeks 6 years (Pre-Kindergarten).
- Children enrolled on a full day/full year (full-time) basis or attending based on extended day needs, wrapping hours around a publicly funded program (i.e. Head Start, public preschool).
- Parents must be either working or attending school. Or caregiver is incapacitated and unable to work or attend school, yet unable to care for the wellbeing of the child.
- Families must show a financial need and fall within the set income guidelines.
- Tuition assistance funds could be used to assist a family with a portion of their family fee obligation when on the DHHS child care subsidy sliding fee scale.

Child Care Subsidy Application and Determination:

- Families who may be eligible for the Child Care Subsidy (CCS) through the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) must first make application to DHHS-CCS and if approved, use public funds prior to use of Early Learning Scholarship funds.
- Current income levels are found on the DHHS website, http://dhhs.ne.gov/Documents/392-000-200.pdf. Income is not the only consideration and there may be circumstances that would enable the family to receive DHHS child care assistance, so making an application is an important step.
- Proof of denial of child care subsidy support may be required by the Child Care Program when it appears the family would be within the income range of qualifying for such subsidy.

Tuition Assistance – Use of Early Learning Scholarships (ELS):

- To be considered for tuition assistance families must:
 - Complete all sections of the Program's tuition assistance application form
 - Provide three most recent paystubs for each working adult in the household
 - When a family has no income to document, that family must submit a signed statement declaring that they have no income.
 - It is expected that families with no documentable forms of income should be referred to local public assistance programs such as ADC, the Child Care Subsidy and SNAP in order to access other services the family may need.
 - Families could be assisted in making such applications by the Program.
 - o Submit a copy of child care subsidy determination letter

Tuition assistance is determined based on the family's monthly gross income (income before taxes, insurance, and any other deductions are subtracted), which includes both earned income (e.g. wages, which must be verified by paystubs) and unearned income (e.g. child support, Social Security payments, Unemployment Insurance). The family income is then compared to the total number of household

members (dependent care—typically parents and their children). If there are two parents in the family, both parents must be participating in one of the activities listed above.

Once a child of any age is awarded tuition assistance, they are eligible to continue to receive this assistance for a 12-month period. Families must reapply in order to be eligible for another 12-month period. Tuition assistance may be cancelled earlier if the family is unresponsive to requests for updated activity or if funding should no longer become available.

Income must be at or below 200% of the Federal Poverty Guideline based on family size. Household members include all people living in the household, related or not (such as grandparents, other relatives, or friends) who share income and expenses. The applicant must include themselves and all children who live with them. Households do not include other people who are economically independent, such as a roommate.

Programs may offer exceptions to these guidelines for tuition assistance due to unforeseen circumstances creating a severe hardship to the family. Exceptions must be documented.

Tuition Assistance Processing Guidelines:

- Families will receive a copy of an application from the qualifying Program to complete and return to the Program.
- A written communication will be shared with the parent/guardian explaining the decision regarding receipt or denial of tuition assistance, and if approved, will include the amount to be covered by the ELS Fund, and effective dates for coverage. A copy of this communication will be kept on file with the child care Program.
- If the number of eligible families is larger than funds available, the Program will track the child's age and months on a wait list. This information will be reviewed on a periodic basis through an evaluation process of the Early Learning Scholarship initiative.

Child Attendance:

The ELS Fund is intended to meet the needs of care for working families. Children should be enrolled on a full-time basis or attending the Program due to a need for care that extends beyond the hours provided by a publicly funded program (i.e. wrapping hours around Head Start or Public Preschool). Drop in or back-up care is defined as care that is used intermittently when the primary program the child attends is not available. Tuition assistance cannot be used for drop in or back-up child care.

Tuition assistance is to be awarded based on an enrollment status, not specific to attendance only. For consistency in application across all programs, if a child is not in attendance for five consecutive days and the family is unreachable after a minimum of three attempts, Programs may opt to cancel the assistance to the family. Additionally, if the child is receiving tuition assistance and is absent for more than 25 days in a year's time without ample notice to the Program, this also may prompt the Program to cancel the assistance to the family. If the participating community is aware of legitimate extenuating circumstances (such as a family or provider needing to quarantine due to COVID-19 exposure or infection), community leads can make individual decisions about when it is appropriate to extend this attendance policy.

Early Learning Scholarship Application / Letter of Commitment for Child Care Providers

The goal of the Early Learning Scholarship is to increase access to high quality care for young children in low and moderate earning families in Nebraska. Funding is being made available to providers engaged in delivery of quality early learning environments and experiences for young children. Participating child care providers are providing ongoing learning, continuous quality improvement, and supporting their early childhood professional workforce through improvements in wages and benefits.

The Early Learning Scholarship is intended to support working families in meeting the high cost of quality care for children six weeks through age 6 (pre-school only) in full day/full year settings or attending the Program due to a need for care that extends beyond the hours provided by a publicly funded program (i.e. wrapping hours around Head Start or Public Preschool).

Eligibility for Child Care Center and Family Child Care Homes:

Child care providers interested in participating in the Early Learning Scholarship opportunity must meet the following qualifications:

- Licensed and in good standing
- Enrolled in Step Up to Quality and have a plan to achieve Step 2 or higher within 12 months, and/or nationally accredited
- Offer full-time, year-round services
- Programs must have a contract (or be willing to obtain a contract) with the Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services to provide care for families on child care subsidy and must be serving at least one child (or be willing to serve children) on subsidy
- Implementing or planning to implement social emotional curricula such as Pyramid Model, Second Step, etc.
- Providing Infant/Toddler Care
- Programs must have or will agree to put a process in place to assure that potentially eligible families are receiving state subsidized dollars before a scholarship is awarded
- Agree to provide and maintain systems for detailed records of tuition assistance provided to eligible families, including attendance records
- Agree to provide required data for a collective evaluation
- Agree to keep completed family applications for scholarship program current and on file
- Agree to submit monthly reimbursement forms to Early Childhood Community Coordinator or designated community coordinator

Would you like to have funds available to help more children from families in need of tuition assistance? With funding from the Preschool Development Grant and the Buffet Early Childhood Institute, the Nebraska Children and Families Foundation was able to launch Early Learning Scholarships to support early childhood education for children facing the greatest odds.

As an early childhood education provider in Nebraska, we are writing to let you know about the upcoming application phase for the Early Learning Scholarship 2021/2022. Children eligible for the Early Learning Scholarship tuition assistance must attend full-time or attend the Program due to a need for care that extends beyond the hours provided by a publicly funded program (i.e. wrapping hours around Head Start or Public Preschool) and be infants, toddlers, or preschoolers.

To be eligible to receive tuition assistance funding from the Early Learning Scholarship, **child care providers must be enrolled at a Step One or higher in the State's Step Up to Quality rating system (and/or nationally accredited)**. Applications for Early Learning Scholarships will be due in 2021. If you are not currently at Step 2, you will have 12 months to reach that level while participating in the Early Learning Scholarships.

Early Learning Fund Provider FAQs

How can child care facilities use funding?

The Early Learning Scholarship will make funds available on a reimbursement basis to pre-qualified early childhood providers who are enrolled in <u>Nebraska's Step Up to Quality</u> rating system (and/or are nationally accredited) and are committed to accepting low-income families. Funding will be available to providers for tuition assistance for families who cannot afford some or all the tuition. The funding will be used to provide tuition assistance so more of Nebraska's infants, toddlers and preschoolers facing the greatest odds may attend quality early childhood programs.

Providers will determine how many additional infants, toddlers, and preschoolers from low-income families they will serve and what tuition assistance is needed for these children. Communities will request funding in an application to Nebraska Children and Families Foundation. Providers will work with their community coordinator to supply information for the community scholarship and request reimbursement funds.

Funding will be made on a reimbursement system based on the number of children the provider serves through the scholarship program. Any modifications to the award or number of children served needs to be submitted to the designated community coordinator in writing for approval.

What is the Federal Poverty Level?

The 2020 <u>Federal poverty level</u> (FPL) is a measure of income issued by the Department of Health and Human Services. Federal poverty levels are used to determine eligibility for certain programs and benefits.

The current FPL for a family of 4 is \$26,200/year. This is also considered 100% of the federal poverty level. Tuition assistance from the Early Learning Scholarship is available to eligible providers to help families who earn up to 200% of the FPL (for a family of 4 that is \$52,400/year).

If my child care facility has multiple locations, can I complete one application for all of them?

Providers must complete an Early Learning Scholarship application for each location/facility that is providing child care and meets the Early Learning Scholarship eligibility requirements. These applications will be submitted to the designated community coordinator.
